This has been a milestone year for the Delaware Health Information Network (DHIN). In 2012 we celebrated our fifth anniversary of being the first live, statewide Health Information Exchange (HIE) in the nation. DHIN provides medical professionals with secure and immediate access to patient medical histories and individual medical needs, efficiently speeding quality care to patients across Delaware. Each year more than 9,000,000 clinical results are delivered via DHIN.

From the outset, we took a leadership role in Delaware and on the national front. We work closely with the federal Medicare and Medicaid agencies to align our goals and technology development efforts with those being advanced nationally. As a fully functional statewide network we have been able to lead by example, and share

the lessons we have learned with other states and regional networks. While beneficial to other states, our leadership has primarily improved care, saved time and reduced costs in the delivery of health care to the citizens of Delaware.

Today, every acute care hospital in the state of Delaware participates in DHIN. The two largest national laboratories, Lab Corp and Quest contribute data to DHIN. Most of the providers in the state of Delaware use DHIN in their daily practice. And most of the residents of Delaware have clinical data present in the DHIN. Everybody in Delaware is benefiting from DHIN today.

As we celebrate these accomplishments, our Board and staff are implementing the new strategic plan for expanded usage and long term sustainability that will guide us through the next stage in our growth. To our customers, funders and partners, we have a deep appreciation for your encouragement and support. We invite you to read the highlights of FY 2012 in this Annual Report.

History

The roots of the Delaware Health Information Network (DHIN) reach back to 1997 when the Delaware General Assembly enacted the law to create the organization as a public/private partnership. The objective was, and remains today, to advance the creation of a statewide health information network that addresses our state's needs for timely, reliable and relevant health care information.

In 2007, DHIN "went live" – meaning it became the first operational statewide health information exchange in the nation. During the last five years DHIN has developed a consistent track record for the safe and secure delivery of clinical results (lab and pathology), reports (both radiology and transcribed), and "face sheets" (offering demographic and billing information).

DHIN has grown rapidly, adding hospitals, nursing care facilities, medical imaging firms and health care providers. Millions of medical history results have been posted to the DHIN system each year for both Delaware and out-of-state patients.

DHIN Today

With the current level of statewide participation in DHIN, it is a national leader in health care. It is using technology to improve patient care, and it is saving time and money in health care delivery.

- 100% of Delaware acute care hospitals participate in DHIN.
- Five hospital emergency departments and laboratories send data through DHIN to the Division of Public Health for public health monitoring.
- Three federally qualified health centers are among the practices receiving results exclusively via DHIN.
- More than 1.4 million unique patients are represented on the network, including patients from all 50 states and 90% of Delaware residents.
- 95% of providers currently practicing in Delaware are enrolled in DHIN.
- More than 5,000 providers and staff at nearly 600 Delaware practices are live on DHIN. Of these practices 280 receive clinical results/reports exclusively through DHIN.
- DHIN delivers more than 9 million clinical results and reports each year.
- Two national reference laboratories (LabCorp and Quest Diagnostics) and a local pathology provider (Doctors Pathology Services) participate in DHIN.
- 80% of laboratory tests ordered or performed in Delaware are reported through DHIN.



Shaping the National Front

The Delaware Health Information Network continues Delaware's legacy as the First State, setting the standard for information and care integration. With all hospitals and skilled nursing facilities connecting to the nation's first statewide health information exchange, key clinical information that was once fractured into information silos across hospitals is now collected by DHIN and made available to providers through a direct connection from DHIN to the provider's electronic health record (EHR) or through a web portal that displays aggregated data sent from all sources. This information gap is no longer an obstacle for the citizens of Delaware.

Leadership Accomplishments

- Delaware was one of only three states awarded federal stimulus dollars for implementation of a health information exchange. The remaining 47 states received money in 2010 to develop a plan that DHIN developed in 2005.
- It had an appointment to the National Health Information Technology Standards Committee statutorily created by the ARRA.
- DHIN provided testimony to a congressional committee charged with defining "Meaningful Use" of health information technology under the ARRA—the basis for ARRA HIT spending.
- It is part of the Nationwide Health Information Network shaping the national approach to health information technology.
- DHIN was named the State Designated Entity for responding to the State Health Information Exchange (HIE) Cooperative Agreement program by Delaware Governor Jack Markell.

A Technology Solution for Better Health Care

A benefit of DHIN technology is saving time and money, but the real impact of DHIN is on patient care. Physicians now have at their fingertips the information they need to quickly determine a proper course of treatment. That information was often delayed or tests had to be repeated before DHIN became available.

2012 Accomplishments

- DHIN has eight certified Electronic Health Record (EHR) results delivery interfaces, meaning that it has verified all data types from all data senders that flow across the interface and populate the EHR correctly. This means that 48% of DHIN practices using an EHR have a certified interface available to them, eliminating workflow disruptions associated with searching for results.
- The Department of Public Health began receiving data through DHIN for public health monitoring, as part of the Medicare and Medicaid Meaningful Use initiative.
- DHIN launched and successfully tested a new disaster recovery system.
- DHIN began work to integrate with the health plans, which would enable them to receive through DHIN the data they are legally allowed to access.
- DHIN successfully completed a major software upgrade enabling new functionality needed for a number of Meaningful Use initiatives and the ability to work with health plans.





Widely Used by Delaware Doctors to Improve Care

Patients in Delaware benefit from improved care when their doctors use the DHIN. DHIN hit its FY 2012 enrollment target with 95% of licensed healthcare providers who order tests currently practicing in Delaware enrolled in DHIN. Over half of these practices receive their results exclusively through DHIN. There are now more than 5,000 health care professionals at over 600 Delaware practices "live" on DHIN.





2012 Accomplishments

- DHIN continued dramatic year-over-year growth of health care providers:
 - 40% growth in practice enrollment
 - 76% growth in signed off practices
 - 38% year-over-year increase in percent of "signed off" practices, those that receive their data exclusively through DHIN.
- 62% of enrolled practices are signed off, exceeding DHIN's FY 2012 goal of 60%.
- Growth of enrollment by county continues, with each county at or above 60% sign-off.
- The Delaware Division of Long Term Care Residents' Protection received grant funding to connect 46 of its skilled nursing facilities to DHIN.
- Decreased percent of aged practices (practices that have been live on DHIN for 3 or more months and not signed-off) from 52% in June 2011 to 35% in June 2012. That is a 33% year-over-year improvement.

Savings by Sending Data through DHIN

Everybody in Delaware is benefiting from DHIN today. Hospitals, laboratories and imaging centers are reducing the costs of delivering health care.

For Delaware health care stakeholders, the Delaware Health Information Network is the common connection. DHIN is growing in membership and complexity. Eventually it will allow patient information to flow securely between all health care participants in real time, making a patient's information available regardless of where the patient goes within the state. In the future, this information will be available nationwide so that travel beyond our state borders will not limit care.

2012 Accomplishments

- This past year the value of using DHIN increased with the addition of six new data senders:
 - Nemours/A.I. duPont Hospital for Children agreed to connect to DHIN in late 2011.
 - Nanticoke Memorial Hospital agreed to connect to DHIN in 2012.
 - Four new radiology and imaging centers now participate:
 - Tri-State Imaging Group
 - Papastavros' Associates Medical Imaging
 - Ocean Medical Imaging
 - Mid-Del Imaging
- Over 95% of medical results generated in the state for Delaware patients are delivered on DHIN.



A Look Ahead

New Technology

DHIN collaborates with its technology partners to continuously add new features and functionality to the network. Physicians attending DHIN's Fifth Anniversary celebration in May were particularly interested in the demonstration of Medicity's "iNexx" platform. That technology will allow physicians to access specific types of product and services relevant to improving patient care.

Medication History Expected Online Later This Year


The next big addition to the DHIN system will enable medical providers to access a patient's medication history. DHIN has been working hard to get that information into the system and it will be available later this year. Prescription information is often not available for doctors treating new patients. Having it online will help eliminate prescribing drugs that may have dangerous interactions with other medicine the patient is taking.

Financial Sustainability

FY 2013 will mark the first year of the transition from Bond Bill funding to operational funding for services being provided by DHIN to the State of Delaware for its employees, retirees and Medicaid beneficiaries. DHIN will also now receive financial support from the private health care community. With these changes DHIN will continue its role as a national leader in financial sustainability for Health Information Exchanges.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- DHIN's total net assets increased 36 percent as a result of FY 2012 operations.
- During FY 2012, DHIN had revenues that were \$584,523 more than the \$5,099,472 generated in total expenses. This improved from FY 2011 when expenses exceeded revenues by \$1,935,172.
- Operating revenues increased by \$536,820 (or 38 percent) during FY 2012 as a result of signing on six new data senders during the year.
- Non-operating revenues increased by \$2,085,393 (or 125 percent) during FY 2012 due to an increase in state funding of \$1.8 million to fund ongoing project support for new data senders, functions, and transaction types that DHIN added. DHIN also received an additional \$239,302 in federal funds under a reimbursable federal grant award.


